Richard Edlow, O.D.
The "Eyeconomist"

MOA's very own Dr. Richard Edlow has become an expert in the economics of Optometry:

Dr. Edlow started his illustrious career with a bachelor's degree in Economics in 1976 from the University of Maryland; he went on to the Pennsylvania College of Optometry where he earned a degree in Visual Sciences in 1977 and Doctor of Optometry in 1980.

In the early 1980's, Dr. Edlow started his career in Baltimore at Katzen Eye Group by spearheading one of the first private-practice integrations of the "three O's"--integrating optical services, primary care optometry, and general ophthalmology. Dr. Edlow served as the CEO of Katzen Eye Group, and was instrumental in the expansion of optometric scope of practice in Maryland and beyond. He was Chairman of the American Optometric Association, Data & Information Committee for 15 years. As a member of the Maryland Optometric Association, he served as President from 1989-1991. He was voted Health Care Professional of the Year by the Governor's Committee on the Handicapped for the State of Maryland in 1989 and the Optometrist of the Year by the Maryland Optometric Association in 1992.



Erin Jenewein, O.D.

Dr. Erin Jenewein is a superstar in pediatrics:

Dr. Jenewein is currently an Assistant Professor at Salus University and the coordinator of their Pediatric/Vision Therapy Residency Program. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in 2003 from St. Norbert College in De Pere, Wisconsin. In 2005, she completed a Master of Science degree in Biology at the University of Wisconsin, Oshkosh.

Dr. Jenewein graduated with highest honors and professional distinction from Nova Southeastern University College of Optometry in 2009. Following graduation, she completed a residency at Nova Southeastern University in Pediatrics and Binocular Vision. From 2010-2015, Dr. Jenewein served as an Assistant Professor and Chief of Service at Nova Southeastern University College of Optometry.

In 2015, Dr. Jenewein joined the professional staff at The Eye Institute at Salus, where she works in the pediatric and binocular vision services. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Optometry and is involved in clinical research including serving as an investigator for the Pediatric Eye Disease Investigator Group.



Mark Dunbar, O.D.

Dr. Mark Dunbar is a verifiable celebrity within the field of ocular disease:

Dr. Dunbar has practiced at the esteemed Bascom Palmer Eye Institute for over 25 years. Dr. Dunbar graduated from Michigan College of Optometry at Ferris State University in 1986 and honed his experience with a Fellowship in Ocular Disease at the Omni Eye Services of

Lexington, Kentucky where he currently serves as the Director of Optometric Services and Optometry Residency Supervisor. Dr. Dunbar is a Fellow of the American Academy of Optometry and has been committed to the expansion of medical optometry as a founding member of the Optometric Glaucoma Society and the Optometric Retina Society.

Dr. Dunbar is committed to expanding our field by mentoring optometry and ophthalmology students at Bascom Palmer and by publishing extensively – serving on the editorial board of Review of Optometry, where he regularly authors the informative Retina Quiz.

Pennye Doud, O.D.

I'm a "retired military brat" growing up along the Mid-Atlantic coast before our family settled in Bowie, MD. I'm the oldest of 3 kids in a VERY nearsighted family and somehow through a family connection, we ended up as the patients of an optometrist in Hershey, PA. One Saturday each year our entire family would make the pilgrimage from Bowie to Hershey to get our eye exams and new glasses. I'll never forget the year that I turned 13 and was allowed to get my ears pierced AND get fitted for contacts! My



very first pair of lenses were Blue PMMA rigid lenses. At that point I was willing to put rocks in my eyes if I didn't have to wear my -7.00 glasses. It was life changing to show up the first day of 8th grade wearing contacts. As an added surprise, my eye doctor also made me a pair of lavender tinted lenses – some days I wore one blue with one lavender just to spice things up.

The experience of my first pair of contacts together with my blossoming love for science is what convinced me that I wanted to be an optometrist. Optometry seemed like the perfect career, you get the best of two worlds – applying science and technology while helping people with their vision and the fashion-fun that goes along with the retail side of our practices.



After graduating from University of Houston College of Optometry in 1989, I returned to MD and miraculously passed the boards on my first try (all of you OGs know what I'm talking about). I worked as an associate in a couple of different practices until establishing Annapolis Vision Center in 1993.

While at UHCO, I was very active in class leadership as well as the American Optometric Student Association. I've enjoyed serving our profession as a member of the MOA Education Committee as well as various leadership roles for the Anne Arundel Optometric Society.

Optometry is such a dynamic profession. I am inspired by and energized by my colleagues, and I continue to be amazed at how many ways there are to practice optometry. After 30 years of practicing primary care, I felt a growing need to treat our patients suffering from dry eyes and decided to add dry eye specialty services to the practice. I have never felt more rewarded as a practitioner in helping these patients. I was especially surprised at how naturally these services morphed into offering aesthetic services as well. Even after three plus decades, I can't tell you how much fun I'm having with optometry!

MOA has been made aware that UHC is dropping providers, sending letters to patient beneficiaries informing them that the doctor is no longer in network. When providers contact the insurer, they are told that they must contract through Spectera to rejoin the UHC network. The AOA Third Party Center is aware of the issue and in contact with UHC working to resolve the issue. If you have experienced a similar issue with UHC or any other vision plan, PLEASE report the matter to the Third Party Center immediately at stopplanabuses@aoa.org.

Doctors of optometry on how to enjoy Oct. 14 eclipse in a safe way
